

Funding Trails and Parks in Prince William County

Supporters of trails and parks are encouraging the Prince William Board of County Supervisors (BOCS) to increase funding in FY27 budget to acquire land for county parks and to construct trails.

That would address top priorities in the just-released **Needs Assessment** for parks and recreation. In addition, a key objective in the **2025-2028 Strategic Plan** (p.11) adopted by the current supervisors is *“Expanding access to public parks, trails, and recreational amenities.”*

The **2024 Comprehensive Plan** recognized that increasing the number of parks and trails would be needed to match the increasing number of residents. Other than the remnants of the special funding approved by voters in a 2019 bond issue, there is currently no dedicated annual funding for parkland acquisition. The plan established the target of having a 10,000-acre park system. Currently, the county has about 5,500 acres.

There has been no funding for trail construction in the county's **Capital Improvements Program** except through the bond issue approved by voters in 2019. Starting in **FY25 budget**, the BOCS has included \$1 million/year for trails construction. The 2040 Mobility Chapter, approved by the Board of County Supervisors in 2022, planned 416 additional miles of trails (including Shared Use Paths alongside highways). If funded, that would expand the existing 205 miles of bike/pedestrian infrastructure.

Only a tiny percentage of the planned expansion of the county park system and trails network can be provided through regional/state/Federal grants and proffers. Actually increasing park acreage and miles of trails will require increasing local funding.

Efforts to increase regional and state funding for trails continue. Nine bike/ped advocacy groups throughout Northern Virginia have sent a **joint letter** to the Northern Virginia Transportation Authority (NVTA) to comment on its **current study** of ways to expand active transportation funding in the region.

In September, the **Trails and Blueways Council** and the **Sustainability Commission** asked the county supervisors to include in the 2026 legislative agenda a request for the General Assembly to add the Potomac Heritage National Scenic Trail (PHNST) to the list of **state prioritized trails** and to provide funding.

PHNST is a trail of more-than-local significance. \$86 million has been allocated by the General Assembly for trails since 2022, but no funding has been provided for Northern Virginia. Based on a recent Federal Land Access Program (FLAP) grant **study**, current cost estimate for closing Gap 2 of the PHNST is \$3.5 million and \$5.8 million for Gap 3.

Elected officials respond to public expressions of voter priorities, so advocates of local trails and parks are proposing that the FY27 budget (to be developed in January-April, 2026) should increase allocations for trail construction from the county's General Fund to \$5 million/year.

In addition, two bond issues should be placed on the November 2026 ballot for voter approval. One bond could include \$300 million for acquiring new land for parks. A separate \$300 million bond could fund construction of trails to create live-work-play communities.

Trails and parks, like schools and roads, are not free. Funding is required to convert the 2040 Comprehensive Plan targets into reality and create live-work-play communities.

Trails and Blueways Council (TBC) Meeting Report

Prince William County **Trails and Blueways Council** met on September 23. Highlights included:

- **Parks and Recreation Commission** will get an update on the Trails Master Plan at its October 15 meeting. Public meeting on draft plan will be held in early November. **Public survey** remains open.
- TBC members prioritized trail construction projects by magisterial district. Top proposals countywide are:
 - expanding Potomac Heritage National Scenic Trail from Neabsco boardwalk to Leesylvania State Park
 - Flat branch trail/shared use path
 - improving Bull Run Trail to Manassas National Battlefield Park

Trails Enhance Economic Development - Really

A *Cardinal News* article, **5 ways that Virginia's changing demography is impacting the state**, highlights that Fairfax County is now losing population. In Arlington, Alexandria, and Prince William County, the number of people in the prime working-age population (25-44 years old) has dropped since 2020. Smaller metropolitan areas are growing as people - especially young families - are moving.

The high cost of housing is a major factor, but the fundamental economic change is that the economy is no longer driven by extraction and processing of natural resources. People do not move to where the minerals or prime farmland are located now.

Instead: *"In today's economy, jobs tend to flow to where the people are — and people are mobile. That's why we see such emphasis on quality-of-life issues, as communities seek to attract or retain a talented labor pool."*

A survey of “**talent wars**” highlights that quality of life (see graphic above) is a key factor for young workers deciding where to live. A significant expansion of parks and trails, obvious enhancements of a community’s quality of life, offers a quick way to compete for young knowledge workers looking at living in Lynchburg or Roanoke - or Prince William County.

Corporate executives deciding where to open new offices look for places where they want to live; tax incentives are just a sweetener in the decision process. To enhance economic development, local governments can “green up” by enhancing parks and trails.



Virginia Bicycling Federation

Virginia Bicycling Advocacy: The Delaware Yield

The **Virginia Bicycling Federation** worked with the Virginia Department of Transportation to refine its **Bicycle Safety** page and **Driver's Manual**.

- *When passing a bicyclist, drivers must slow to a reasonable speed and keep the right edge of their vehicle (including the mirror) at least three feet to the left of the overtaken bicycle and its rider.*
- *Drivers may cross any centerline to pass a bicyclist with the required three-foot or greater gap.*

Efforts to get the Virginia General Assembly to authorize the **Delaware Yield** (where bikers, under limited circumstances, are allowed to treat a stop sign as a “yield” in order to maintain momentum and cross an intersection more quickly) have not succeeded - yet. The Delaware Yield is already lawful in 11 states plus Washington DC.




Increasing Access to the Waterfront

Prince William County has launched an economic development study to “activate” the waterfront. The most recent Needs Assessment for recreation identified access to the water for boating and fishing areas as a high priority (see p.11).

One solution to the “demand exceeds supply” challenge is to increase the number of public boat ramps. In the 2024 Comprehensive Plan, the Land Use Map classified a parcel at the mouth of Quantico Creek as Parks and Open Space (POS). A boat ramp there would be suitable for motorboats, while a waterfront park planned by the Town of Dumfries could provide a canoe/kayak/paddleboard ramp.

Another solution is to make existing ramps more useable. The Prince William Parks Foundation has proposed adding self-service kayak kiosks at two launch points, the Neabsco Creek Boardwalk and Silver Lake Regional Park. The Neabsco Creek site would eliminate the need to haul boats 1/4 mile from the parking lot, though the boating opportunities are limited during low tide.

A self-service kayak kiosk may also be appropriate at Lake Ridge Marina. Except between June 16-August 15, the boat rental operation there has limited hours of operation.



The Occoquan Greenway will remain open while Prince William Water replaces the sewer pump station at Spinnaker Court. Jason Williams and other volunteers “bench cut” a new stretch of Segment 7.

Coordinating Trails Planning, Construction, and Maintenance with Prince William Water

The Prince William Department of Parks and Recreation is planning to build trails that cross underground water/sewer pipelines managed by Prince William Water, and maintains some existing trails within Prince William Water easements.

Coordination of construction, renovation and maintenance projects will be enhanced by formalizing the process through a Memorandum of Understanding, which the Board of County Supervisors is requested to authorize on October 7.

Prince William Water plans to provide stone dust trails when feasible as part of its new projects.

Each agency will facilitate efforts to create tri-party agreements between the county, Prince William Water, and the property owner to permit both public trail use and water/wastewater infrastructure.



Rails to Trails

As highlighted in the story [Meet us on the rail trail](#) in the *Washington Post* on September 28, PBS will broadcast [From Rails to Trails](#) on October 15:

“Edward Norton narrates the story of one of the most unlikely social movements in American history: the struggle to convert thousands of miles of abandoned railroads into trails for cycling and walking. Facing fierce opposition and legal challenges from private property owners, leaders fought to reclaim these corridors for the public, creating a national network of scenic, car-free paths.”

Locally, Prince William County, Manassas, and Manassas Park are cooperating on a [rail-with-trail project](#) connecting the railroad depots in Manassas and Manassas Park, with an extension across Bull Run to the [Bull Run Occoquan Trail](#) in Fairfax County. That trail would parallel (not replace) the existing rail line.

Also, the Virginia Outdoor Adventures podcast [featured](#) the Dahlgren Railroad Heritage Trail on September 23. That rail-to-trail project is the closest completed segment of the Potomac Heritage National Scenic Trail south of Prince William County.
